The British Pain Society is the largest multidisciplinary professional organisation in the field of pain within the UK. Our membership comprises medical pain specialists, nurses, physiotherapists, scientists, psychologists, occupational therapists and other healthcare professionals actively engaged in the diagnosis and treatment of pain and in pain research for the benefit of patients. Our multidisciplinary nature is pivotal in making our society a uniquely relevant representative body on all matters relating to pain.

The British Pain Society is the British Chapter of the International Association for the Study of Pain (IASP) and is part of the European Pain Federation (EFIC).

COMMITTEES

Ongoing work of the Society is divided between several Committees formed by members of Council and Co-opted Members of the Society. Current Committees include:

Science and Research – responsible for implementing the Society's scientific and research strategies. Work of the Committee has ranged from advising the NHS and private health care organisations to supporting individual research projects of Society members. The Committee also makes decisions on the allocation of bursaries and awards to members of the Society.

Communications – responsible for ensuring that information and publications produced by the Society are made accessible to the relevant audience in an appropriate format. The Communications Committee oversees the development of the Society website, and publications.

Scientific Programme Committee – this committee's main responsibility is to put together the scientific programme for the Society's Annual Scientific Meeting and to ensure that the content is of the highest possible standard and that it reflects current theory and practice in all aspects of pain management.

Education – this committee's main responsibility is to develop and implement educational programs and activities including webinars, one-day courses and other events.

The Patient Voice Committee – this committee is made up of up to eight members with lived experience and four professional members and is responsible for ensuring that the views of patients and carers with lived experience are represented within the Society.

SECRETARIAT

The Secretariat coordinate the work of the Society, manage press queries and provide support for the Officers, Council Members and Committees. They organise webinars, smaller events and educational activities.

SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS (SIGS):

The British Pain Society has developed a mechanism by which members of the Society who have a specific interest are given a forum to discuss their interest in more depth. The Society actively encourages and supports the development of such Special Interest Groups, as they are an important element of the multidisciplinary Society. There are currently twelve Society SIGs; Acute Pain, Headache, Interventional Pain Medicine, Medicolegal, Neuropathic Pain, Pain in Children, Pain in Developing Countries, Pain Education, Pain Management Programmes, Pain in Older People, Philosophy & Ethics and Primary & Community Care.

BURSARIES AND AWARDS

To encourage and promote the study and research into aspects of pain, the Society has established several bursaries and awards that are available to its members. Current bursaries and awards offered by the Society include the Patrick Wall Travel Bursary, for the presentation of research overseas; the Clulow Research Award, to fund research into the causes and cure of pain.

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ANNUAL SCIENTIFIC MEETING

The highlight of the British Pain Society calendar is the Annual Scientific Meeting. The Meeting is held over three days and each year takes place at a different location in the UK. There have been 56 Scientific Meetings to date with the 57th taking place in Nottingham in 2024. The Meeting includes a comprehensive scientific programme, a poster exhibition, a technical exhibition and satellite meetings.

The aim of the Meeting is to encourage professionals from all disciplines involved in the management of pain to exchange ideas and increase understanding in all aspects of pain and pain management. Responses from delegates over recent years have shown the meeting to be a highly effective medium for continuing education and professional development.
